DC alumna joins leadership team

More than 25 years after graduating from DC's Public Relations program, Linda Marco has returned as the new associate vice-president, Office of Development and Alumni Affairs. In addition, she is president of the Durham College Foundation.

In these roles, Marco is responsible for implementing strategies to engage current and potential donors; ensuring funds are invested and stewarded appropriately; and developing a sense of loyalty and commitment among the college's alumni community.

"Durham College has an amazing reputation in the community," said Marco. "I've lived in Durham Region for more than 15 years and have been watching the college's growth. Although most of the people and the buildings have changed, I still feel the same welcoming culture as I did as a student." Prior to joining DC, Marco was the director of Advancement for Lakeridge Health Foundation where she helped educate the community about health-care services available in Durham Region, encouraging donors to give where they live. This included managing development programs such as major gifts, third-party events and direct response campaigns, generating an annual revenue of more than \$3.5 million. Additionally, she successfully implemented a new visual identity for the foundation and hospital and developed a 10-year comprehensive campaign to raise funds for the redevelopment of Lakeridge Health.

Marco also served as director of Fund Development for Scientists in School, where she created the organization's inaugural fund development plan and attracted new corporate donors. Additional roles in her career include director of Funds Development for the Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation and director of Development for the Children's Wish Foundation.

In addition to her Public Relations diploma, Marco holds a Fundraising Management certificate from Ryerson University and has achieved her Canadian Fund Raising Executive accreditation. Her extensive fundraising experience and ability to develop key relationships are sure to help shape the future of the college as she provides senior-level leadership to the Office of Development and Alumni Affairs as well as the Durham College Foundation.

"The funds we raise and the connections we make directly affect the student experience at DC," said Marco. "I am looking forward to showcasing and connecting with our more than 73,000 alumni."



DC honours outstanding students; recognizes award donors

Alumni profile:

It is no secret that DC Alumni Ian Ball has made a name for himself on Bay Street. After graduating from the college's Marketing – Business Administration program in 2002, Ball used his networking prowess and business savvy to impress well-known businessman Robert McEwen. With McEwen's guidance, he quickly hoisted his way to the top, becoming one of the youngest-ever vice-presidents of a publicly traded Canadian company by the age of 22.

As head of Investor Relations at Goldcorp Inc., Ball successfully completed a number of corporate mergers and acquisitions, positioning himself as a key player in the creation of McEwen Mining (McEwen), a gold and silver producer with 1,700 employees operating in four countries. In 2013, he was named president of McEwen and during his time

with the company he helped build it from a \$5 million market capitalization to \$750 million and established it as a publicly traded company on the New York Stock Exchange.

After working with McEwen for 10 years, Ball was eager to break new ground and set his sights on Abitibi Royalties. Once again, he was able to impress with his innovative ideas and unconventional methods, securing himself the position of chief executive officer in 2014.

Never forgetting his time at DC before becoming the golden boy of Bay Street, Ball annually supports students through the scholarship and bursary program by funding the Ian J. Ball award. The gift recognizes the student who shows the most improvement from Year 1 to Year 2 in the Marketing – Business Administration program.

Ball continues to give back by returning often to DC, inspiring students to challenge their limits and reach for success. This includes speaking at the college's Alumni in the Pit event as well as addressing the graduating class at DC's 2014 spring convocation ceremony.

In 2016, he returned to the classroom to speak to third-year marketing students. In addition to providing these soon-to-be graduates with his words of wisdom, Ball presented each student with a copy of the book Moneyball: The Art of Winning an Unfair Game by Michael Lewis. Inside each copy he included a note to the students explaining the story taught him a valuable lesson, "if you do the same as everyone else, don't expect to be more than average."



Centre for Food unveils donor wall to recognize generosity of community

Seven years ago, an idea was planted at DC to create a facility that would change the way our local communities eat and grow food as well as meet the growing demands of the local culinary, hospitality, tourism, agriculture and horticulture sectors. The idea sprouted into a vision and, with the generous support of many donors, has come to fruition and continues to blossom.

On Monday, January 25, a donor wall was unveiled at the college's Centre for Food (CFF) to honour its donors as well as establish a distinct marker where all donors could be recognized for years to come.

"Our vision for the Centre for Food was to bring field-to-fork to Durham Region, while creating a place where students would receive an exceptional, hands-on learning experience," said Don Lovisa, president, DC. "Thanks to the support of our donors, we have been able to substantially grow our vision and make great strides in advancing our programs, grounds, research projects, facility and offerings to our students and the community." To complement the warm and natural atmosphere of the CFF, the wall was designed using walnut name plates and metallic inlays in platinum, gold, silver and bronze that denote the amount of each donation.

"On behalf of everyone at DC, I would like to truly thank all our donors for believing in our vision and helping us to establish a state-of-the art facility that supports both the success of our students and the economic development of our communities," said Linda Marco, associate vice-president, Office of Development and Advancement. "This is exciting for all of us here at the college and testament to your collective support and commitment to the CFF."

Lovisa also announced that a new \$1 million donation towards the CFF has recently been confirmed, and details will be shared publicly in the coming months.

The CFF has the capacity to accommodate 900 students, and is Durham Region's first-ever post-secondary presence focused on field-to-fork. In addition to Bistro '67 – a green-certified teaching restaurant, the CFF


houses Pantry, a retail store featuring fresh-baked items, meals-to-go, preserved foods and ready-to-cook meals created by students in the college's culinary programs. The grounds feature an apple orchard, gardens, farm fields and greenhouses that support academic applied-learning and research while growing fruits, vegetables and other produce for use in its kitchens, laboratories and Bistro '67.



Sports shorts

After a successful fall season that saw the Durham Lords women's softball team win its record-setting 17th Ontario Colleges Athletics Association (OCAA) championship, the winter teams are looking to match its performance.

The women's volleyball team, which earned an OCAA silver medal in 2015, is back in the national spotlight, landing a spot in the Canadian Collegiate Athletics Association (CCAA) rankings. Led by head coach Tony Clarke who was named OCAA coach of the year, the Lords won the OCAA eastern division to earn a bye into the OCAA provincial championship.

The men's volleyball team has also found success on the court beating Humber College in a crossover match to qualify for the OCAA championship for the fourth straight season.

Led by CCAA All-Canadian Lindsay Panchan, the women's basketball team is also contending for a medal in 2016. Panchan led the league in scoring, averaging 24.6 points per game and also led the OCAA with 12.5 rebounds per game. The Lords host a qualifying game against St. Clair College with a spot at the championship on the line.

The men's basketball team has been rebuilding this season after winning its first OCAA medal since 1997 in 2015. Head coach Desmond Rowley has brought in new faces who continue to grow on and off the court every day.

Rounding out winter sports are the men's and women's indoor soccer teams who will be taking part in the OCAA regional championships later this month.



DC's CFF wins prestigious design award

The CFF, which is known for its unique blend of creativity and innovation in design, was recently awarded a 2015 Association of Registered Interior Designers of Ontario (ARIDO) Award.

With the capacity to accommodate 900 students, the CFF is Durham Region's first-ever post-secondary presence focused on field-to-fork. Designed by Gow Hastings Architects, it offers warm woods, soft stones and natural colours that create an inviting and open atmosphere conveying a connection to nature. Ample windows cast light into the heart of the building's atrium where a two-storey living-wall herb garden highlights the space. The atrium also serves as a central meeting place for special events and celebrations. Showcasing food preparation, the windows on the floor above provide a glimpse into the culinary labs, where marble, Corian, stainless steel and ceramic tile reduce visual clutter, maintain sanitation and enhance function.

"Gow Hastings Architects truly brought our vision for the CFF to life," said Don Lovisa, president, DC. "We were committed to the creation of a unique teaching and learning facility that could also support cooking demonstrations, workshops and corporate events; Bistro '67, our full-service, teaching-inspired restaurant; and Pantry, our retail store, while utilizing eco-friendly elements and maintaining an atmosphere of innovation and creativity. This wonderful recognition confirms that we have done just that."

While recognizing the exceptional work of ARIDO members and celebrating the best in Ontario's design profession, the awards also serve to raise awareness of the power and effect of interior design among the Ontario public.
